FROM THE WINEMAKER: BEST-LAID PLANS

Last year I wrote a roundup of all the things we have to juggle while getting ready to finish a wine to bottle, so I won't belabor the point, but today was the day we were supposed to bottle our 2017 whites and Rosé. If that had happened, I wouldn't be sitting here jotting down these notes.



I got the labels a week ago, and it was a good thing they didn't arrive at the last minute, because the plant had swapped the quantities for Gewürztraminer and Riesling so that we had way more than we needed of one and not enough of the other. A quick call to our supplier and we got new labels overnighted in time, no problem.

The bottles came in last week; yep, we had the right number of Hock-shaped bottles (for Gewürz and Riesling) and yep, we had the proper number of clear Burgundy bottles for the Rosé. And we had the right numbers of blue and red screwcaps. Last Friday, we were dialed in and set to go.

First up this morning was the Riesling. Funny thing ... the bottles were for cork finish, not screwcap. We've used the same glass for years, so I had assumed that was also correct without opening a box . It could have been a real hassle — but, miracle of miracles, the glass folks could get me the right stuff today (in fact, I just got a call confirming that the order has arrived), and the bottling line was somehow not booked for tomorrow.



So, we're good to go first thing tomorrow with not a thing needing to be done to salvage the process, other than calling around to put together a crew to do all the schlepping and stacking. You just have to roll with it sometimes.

Finger crossed.
